

The Adventures of a Molehunter


NIGEL WEST

Nigel West is perhaps our most authoritative writer on espionage and the secret services. His first encounter with the intelligence community was a lecture given at his school by John le Carré, the guest of a Benedictine monk. The monk inspired many of his pupils to join the intelligence community.

West's most recent investigation involved the identification of a Soviet mole inside the Australian Security Intelligence Organisation in 2023. In between, he worked as a researcher for a wartime SOE agent, Ronnie Seth, who was sentenced to death by the Nazis after being captured during Operation Blunderhead; exposed two of the Cambridge spies recruited by Anthony Blunt; and participated in an MI5 operation to obtain a deathbed confession from a suspected Soviet spy who had joined MI5 in 1937 and risen to be deputy director-general by 1963.

In 1984, in time for the fortieth anniversary of the D-Day landings, West traced the MI5 double agent codenamed GARBO – perhaps the most influential spy of the Second World War – to Venezuela and brought him to London so he could be decorated at Buckingham Palace.

As action-packed as the lives of the spies he has written about, Classified! is the surprising life story of one of our most celebrated writers.

SEX, SPIES AND SCANDAL

The John Vassall Affair



Sex, Spies and Scandal is the story of John Vassall, a civil servant who was unmasked as a Soviet spy in 1962. After being photographed in compromising positions while working at the British embassy in Moscow in 1954, Vassall was blackmailed into handing over secrets from the British Admiralty to his Soviet handlers, both in Moscow and in London, for more than seven years.

There has been a rash of successful recent books and film adaptations on the Profumo, Thorpe and Duchess of Argyll affairs. The story of John Vassall, who was responsible for a far more serious intelligence breach than Profumo, is ripe for retelling. It has got the lot – a honeytrap, spying on an industrial scale, journalists jailed for not revealing their sources, and the first modern tabloid witch-hunt, which resulted in a ministerial resignation and almost brought down Harold Macmillan's government.

With access to newly released MI5 files and interviews with people who knew Vassall from the 1950s until his death in 1996, this book sheds new light on the neglected spy scandal of the early 1960s.

Including atmospheric detail on Dolphin Square in the 1950s and '60s – a hotbed of political intrigue but also a safe haven for members of the LGBT community – this is an explosive tale of sexual violence, betrayal, cover-up, homophobia and hypocrisy that blows open some of the British establishment's darkest secrets.



IAN ACHESON has served as both an officer and a prison governor. In 2015, the then Secretary of State for Justice, Michael Gove, asked him to lead an independent review into prison extremism, which laid bare a corporate culture of ineptitude, secrecy and arrogance that threatened national security. He now works nationally and internationally advising governments on prison reform and countering violent extremism.


When Daniel Khalife escaped from Wandsworth in September 2023, the nation got a glimpse into the chaos at the heart of its prison system. This came as no surprise to Ian Acheson, who had once governed Wandsworth.

Screwed is the inside story of the collapse of His Majesty's Prison Service, told from the front line. Ian Acheson served as both officer and governor in a twenty-year career that saw him move from the landings to the boardroom.

During that time, he witnessed His Majesty's Prison Service, the uniformed organisation he was proud to serve, collapse into a hopeless and helpless bureaucracy presiding over feral penal dustbins warehousing the worst of human failure.

This hard-hitting account looks at the politics and the operational decision-making that have driven our prisons to rock bottom, where extreme violence, indolence and victimisation are normalised.

Concluding that the situation is not beyond repair, however, Acheson outlines how a new corporate culture and mission can achieve a much-needed revolution in the way the service is run.

A life without and within books


VYBARR CREGAN-REID

On being a visibly Muslim woman



Nadeine Asbali would be the first to say that a scarf on a woman's head doesn't define her, but in her case, that's a lie.

For Nadeine, her life changed overnight. As a mixed-race teenager, she had unknowingly been passing as white her entire life. Until she decided to wear the hijab. Then, in an instant, she went from being an unassuming white(ish) child to something sinister and threatening, perverse and foreign.

Written in a sharp and illuminating voice, Veiled Threat is a necessary exploration of what it is to be a visibly Muslim woman in modern Britain, a nation intent on forced assimilation and integration that views covered bodies as primitive and dangerous. From being constantly bombarded by racist stereotypes to being subjected to structural inequalities at every level, Nadeine asks why Muslim women are forced to grapple the twin oppressions of state-sanctioned Islamophobia and patriarchal norms within their own community, all while being told by white feminists that they need saving.

Full of passionate and personal argument, Veiled Threat is an indictment on a divided Britain that dominates and systematically others Muslim women at every level.


DEATH OF A BOXER

PETE CARVILL

Since 1995, there have been four deaths following fights in Britain and forty around the world. In *Death of a Boxer*, Pete Carvill sets out to explore the psychology of those who choose to fight and what draws them towards this most dangerous of pursuits.

But to write about only the death of fighters would be half the story. Carvill, who has written extensively on boxing and combat sports for fifteen years, will take off his own gloves and pick up a pen to explore the lives of fighters, from the early days in amateur clubs to established professionals, those down on their luck to the retired still hankering to do what once came so easily to them.

A deep and powerful meditation on the nature of boxing that asks why people do it, what it does for them – and ultimately to them. This may be the most important book on the sport for decades.

The Miracle of Prague

Massive charts West Ham's tumultuous 2022-23 season and epic triumph in the Europa Conference League Final in Prague, their first trophy in forty-three years and first European trophy in fifty-eight years. There were plenty of ups and downs during the season, with misfiring signings, three occasions when manager David Moyes was nearly sacked in 'must-win' games and dissent among the fans.

However, West Ham eventually found survival in the Premier League and redemption in the Europa Conference League. The Irons played fifteen games in Europe and were unbeaten. At the age of sixty, Moyes won his first major trophy and presented his medal to his 87-year-old father. Captain Declan Rice ended his Hammers career by holding up a trophy, just like Bobby Moore and Billy Bonds before him.

The outpouring of joy at the final whistle in Prague will never be forgotten by West Ham fans - many of whom were too young to have seen their side win its last trophy in 1980.

Why Private Office Matters



The United Kingdom, famously, does not have a written constitution. Rather, our political system has been shaped not by revolution, foreign invasion or dictatorship but by a series of principles and conventions that have emerged and been tested, then accepted.

But one part of that system has never received any detailed scrutiny: the private office - the small group made up mainly of civil servants who support and advise every minister of the Crown, from the Prime Minister down to the most junior of ministers. Private secretaries inevitably have, by dint of their access to ministers and the Prime Minister, massive influence.

However, in recent years, ministerial pressures for a politicised private office have inevitably brought the civil service into conflict with the government.

With exceptional access to former Prime Ministers and decision-makers, Alun Evans describes what the private office is and why it matters and - following the egregious constitutional breaches of the Johnson premiership – argues for a reversion to the previous arrangements whereby the private office truly can be, once again, the independent junction box of government and a vital part of the British constitution.

RED QUEEN?

The unauthorised biography of Angela Rayner

Angela Rayner is one of the most arresting figures in British politics today. A self-declared socialist, she pursued an unorthodox route into politics, leaving school aged sixteen while pregnant having gained no formal qualifications. After becoming a care worker, she was a trade union representative before entering the House of Commons in 2015 as the Labour MP for Ashton-under-Lyne. She served as the shadow Secretary of State for Education for four years from 2016 and was elected deputy leader of the Labour Party in April 2020.

Rayner's life story has earned her a reputation as an authentic working-class voice, and, thanks to her own power base and combative performances in the Commons chamber, she is widely considered to be a standout figure among Sir Keir Starmer's shadow Cabinet.

But who is the real Angela Rayner? What does she actually believe in? What is she like behind the scenes? Can she unite the factions of her party to endorse the Starmer project? And does she harbour ambitions for the top job? This careful examination of her background and career seeks to answer these questions and many more. Michael Ashcroft's new book follows the journey of a politician who has quickly become an outspoken and charismatic presence in British public life and who promises to be a lively addition to the government should Labour win the next general election.


How the '80s rocked football

In the 1980s politicians declared war on football; football supporters declared war on each other inside crumbling stadia that resembled bomb sites, and the '82 and '86 World Cups were played against the backdrop of the Falklands conflict. It was the decade when some fans died watching the sport they loved and at times, football seemed set to die too.

The decade also saw the emergence of West Ham's blonde bombshell Frank McAvennie, the very 1980s rivalry between Luton Town and Watford, the birth of the long-ball game, early sponsorship deals, the inflatable craze of the late 1980s, Saint & Greavsie, the arrival of plastic pitches and fanzines, mullets and back perms, travelling behind the Iron Curtain for matches and short-lived competitions like the Full Members' Cup.

Like its prequel, the bestselling Get It On, this book draws heavily on the recollections of the footballers and managers who set the tone for the decade, providing a unique insight into the contemporary game and blending football stories with historical, political and cultural insights.

For almost half a century, Bertram Mills Circus was a household name throughout Britain among both children and adults and it's Director, Cyril Bertram Mills, was one of the best-known and most influential names in the country's entertainment business.

But for forty years, Cyril Mills had also enjoyed a top-secret and wide-ranging career in British intelligence: obtaining the best aerial intelligence on Nazi rearmament for MI6 before the Second World War; becoming the first case officer to monitor the best double agent (Garbo) of the war after joining MI5; and working part-time during the Cold War 'for MI5 or 6 or both without being paid a penny'.

Remarkably, no word of Mills's secret career appeared in public until he was over eighty. Nobody suspected that the glamorous world of pre-war circus entertainment had been an extraordinarily fitting rehearsal for the lethal arena of deception and surveillance. In this remarkable true story, Christopher Andrew, best-selling official biographer of MI5, brings to life one of the most surprising and fascinating tales of espionage ever told.



LIZ TRUSS continuously held ministerial office for more than ten years between 2012 and 2022. After an initial spell as a junior education minister, she sat at the Cabinet table in six different roles, prior to becoming Prime Minister: Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs: Lord Chancellor and Secretary of State for Justice; Chief Secretary to the Treasury; Secretary of State for International Trade; and Foreign Secretary - as well as Minister for Women and Equalities.

TEN YEARS TO SAVE THE WEST

Lessons from the Only Conservative in the Room

LIZ TRUSS

In *Ten Years to Save the West*, Truss, who as Prime Minister sought to champion limited government and individual freedom, will argue that the rise of authoritarianism and the adoption of fashionable ideas propagated by the global left give us barely a decade to preserve the economic and cultural freedom and institutions that the west holds so dear.

Peppered with newsworthy anecdotes from Truss's time in public life – such as her memorable last meeting with Queen Elizabeth II, her confrontations with Vladimir Putin and Xi Jinping as Foreign Secretary, her encounters with the Trump administration as Trade Secretary and her dismay at the political class's attempt to betray Brexit – Ten Years to Save the West will also offer a timely warning about the perils facing conservatism in the years ahead. In it, Truss warns that too many of her fellow conservatives have allowed themselves to be captured by the left-wing influences that set the agenda and frame the debate in so many institutions, from the media to academia to the corporate world.

She will also call for a return to the alliances built by leaders such as Ronald Reagan and Margaret Thatcher in another era when Western values were under siege. Truss argues that we can only guarantee voters a free and meaningful choice in their destiny if the west recommits to building strong societies and strong economies, unhampered by big government and regulation.

THE TRIAL OF VLADIMIR PUTIN


There have been dozens of books about the Russian President Vladimir Putin since he launched his illegal invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. Some have examined the historical aspects of the conflict, others have analysed its military and geopolitical importance. However, none so far have looked purely at the legal consequences of that disastrous action.

This remarkable survey by one of our most celebrated human rights lawyers examines how the war in effect destroys the purpose of the United Nations by exposing the fatal flaw in its 1945 Charter: all five permanent UN members have a veto on any Security Council action.

Russia cannot be expelled from the General Assembly for breaching the Charter without a Security Council recommendation, which Russia itself can veto!

Geoffrey Robertson looks at the difficulties of bringing Putin to trial and why the popular campaign for a court to try him *in absentia* would not work; gives an explanation of the International Criminal Court charges he already faces; and surmises that any future peace agreement would include an amnesty for Putin (though, that amnesty would not be valid in international law).

This brilliant deep-dive into international law offers a unique perspective on an unjust war that has cost the lives of hundreds of thousands of people and threatens to overturn the accepted world order, through the lens of its key protagonist.

THE COMING STORM

The impending crisis on water – and how to avoid it

Following Russia's aggressive war in Ukraine, the world is suddenly gripped by concerns over energy security. And yet, there is an even greater threat ahead – one that is even more likely to shape the events of the twenty-first century than the competition for oil or gas.

The combination of an ever-increasing global population, climate change, industrialisation, urbanisation and limited natural resources, means that one challenge, above all, will shape the political, economic and security environment in the years ahead. That challenge is water.

If people and nations will fight for fossil fuels, it is nothing compared to what they will do for the most vital natural resource of all.



Throughout his career Churchill was an outsider. He was a serial defector and, for most of the 1930s, a conspicuous internal opponent of his party's leaders. He accumulated a reputation for bad judgement and untrustworthiness. Only risk-takers and fellow outsiders would back him. He needed the company of like-minded individuals to create a social environment in which his personality could flourish. They were the acute and vigorous sparringpartners with whom he could hold the lively discussions which were life itself to him, in the convivial and epicurean surroundings he craved.

Lord Beaverbrook deployed the fortune he had amassed in his native Canada in obscure financial dealings to make a position for himself in Britain. F.E Smith - later Lord Birkenhead - a lifelong tory but worlds apart from the conventionally bland figures of the party. Brendan Bracken, the model for the shady and oafish parvenu politician Rex Mottram in Evelyn Waugh's Brideshead Revisited. Bob Boothby, who would conduct a long and scandalous affair with the wife of Harold Macmillan, and Charles Lindemann – later Lord Cherwell -an ascetic. vegetarian and near-teetotal, who understood the vital importance of matching Nazi Germany's headlong expansion of its air force and understood far better than many that science would play a key part in the next war.

These were the men Churchill relied on before, during and after the war. This book tells the story of their friendship and of the part they played both in Churchill's triumphs and disasters.





The Best of Enemies is the political diaries of Norman Fowler, one of the most significant politicians of the late twentieth century. Covering the entire Thatcher/Major era - from the former's election in 1979 to the latter's defeat in 1997 – during which time Fowler held prominent positions in the Cabinet. As Transport Secretary he was responsible for making seat belts compulsory and later, as Health Secretary, he worked to draw public attention to the dangers of Aids. He was Chairman of the party from 1992-94.

His diaries observe both Prime Ministers, and their Cabinet colleagues, at close guarters and Fowler brings his training as a journalist to bear on them. The diaries are full of insights and anecdotes and they resonate powerfully with the situation facing the Conservative Party today, including industrial strife, waning authority and a Labour Party looking like a government in waiting.

The entries raise other issues that remain unresolved. They range from the effect that a minister's private sexual conduct should have on their career to whether an entirely 'hands-off' approach to industrial strategy is in the national interest.

Fowler's diaries provide a ringside seat to the struggles of their time. These are not the diaries of an ex-minister seeking to justify their own record. They are the story of how two Prime Ministers rose and fell and caused their party to split apart, told by someone who was there.


The Denis MacShane Diaries 1997–2001





Even worse, more often than not they either win their cases or scare their opponents into self-censorship, in a devastating blow to investigative journalism, media freedom and the public interest.

In this timely, insightful and often shocking book, David Hooper, veteran media lawyer, explores how the power of money enables the very wealthy – including Robert Maxwell, Nadhim Zahawi and McDonald's – to crush their critics through SLAPP tactics. From billionaire oligarchs to powerful corporations, from corrupt politicians to super-rich businesspeople, Hooper describes how those with something to hide tried to stop you knowing about it, how their lawyers were willing to help them and – most importantly – what the government urgently needs to do to stop them.


Cancellation, Stealth Censorship and **Cultural Warfare**

JOHN SUTHERLAND

Amid the flames of the culture wars, politicians have taken up arms over controls on literary culture, spurred on in part by universities 'triggering' canonical texts. Jonathan Swift's 'Battle of the Books' has flared up again. But is 'triggering' utter wokery or responsible pedagogic practice?

Through dozens of case studies of triggered works, from Romeo and Juliet to Gender Oueer, John Sutherland explores the recent phenomenon of triggering and its consequences for university English departments and literature itself. He maintains that what is routinely overlooked in the heat of polemic is that triggering is categorically different from traditional institutional (religious, educational, dictatorial) controls on literature. Triggering is in essence an alert. Done responsibly it does not erase or meddle; it stimulates curiosity and thought. It honours the fact that great literature is great because it is, as Franz Kafka says, powerful.

In this characteristically nuanced and calmly objective study, the witty literary critic guides us through the increasingly rocky terrain of triggering. His advice rings clear: literature matters, to us and what we make of our world, and it must be handled with critical care.

political historian and has taught at King's College London since 2017. 


The Chequered History of Britain's Wartime Refugees

PAUL DOWSWELL

The welcome given to refugees from fascist Europe is part of our fond nostalgia for Britain's role in the Second World War, nestling in our imagination next to images of evacuees clutching teddy bears, and milkmen picking their way through bomb rubble during the Blitz. But there is a darker side to this story. Then, as now, there was great suspicion, resentment and fear towards new arrivals, much of it kindled by the tabloid press. Then, as now, politicians dealt with a reluctance to accommodate refugees by hiding behind bureaucratic hurdles and obfuscation.

Many of the 10,000 Kindertransport children who arrived here in the late 1930s have warm memories of the kindness they were shown, but half a million refugees were refused entry and most of them died as a result. And those who were accepted found their troubles far from over. While Britain fearfully awaited invasion in 1940, 30,000 Jews were interned as 'enemy aliens' and some were sent off to the colonies on dangerous and sometimes fatal voyages. Nor were Jews the only refugees clamouring for the thin gruel of public sympathy. Those fleeing fascism and civil war elsewhere in Europe found that whether they were met with kindness or hostility depended on the locals' political affiliations and newspapers of choice.

Interweaving personal testimonies with historical sources, Paul Dowswell casts a fresh eye on the wartime era, painting a vivid picture of what life was really like for Britain's refugees.






